# HEARD THROUGH THE GREAT VINE Say Whaaaat?

Lysol I.C. Disinfectant Cleaner for Botrytis, Black Spot, Powdery Mildew... and Deer Control? Chris Wilson & Brian Hall, Hallson Gardens Newsletter

Don't you just love happy accidents? This year we had one when we decided to try using Lysol® Brand I.C.™ Quaternary Disinfectant Cleaner to prevent botrytis leaf spot on our lily crop. The lilies we sprayed had virtually no leaf spotting, turning in an awesome display in the gardens and one of our best

potted crops in the nursery. But that wasn't the surprise. The incredible side effect was that the resident deer didn't touch them!

The deer walked through the nursery and nibbled on Hydrangeas and daylilies, munched on hostas and Fine Line buckthorn, but never touched the lilies. In the display garden they were eating just about everything, but again not touching the lilies.

How did we know to use Lysol I.C. on our lilies in the first place? Years ago our chemical supplier recommended and sold us Consan 20 as an all purpose fungicide to treat Botrytis leaf spot and powdery mildew, among other things, and it worked pretty well. At the time we were using Lysol I.C. as a surface and tool cleaner, for cleaning and disinfecting used nursery containers, and for cleaning our hosta soaking tubs and wash areas.

After purchasing Consan 20 we noticed the liquids looked and smelled the same so we checked the labels and noticed that the active ingredients were nearly identical too. This year we mixed up the Lysol I.C. concentrate at a rate of 2 teaspoons per gallon, the rate listed for Consan 20 for plant treatments, and test sprayed it on different plants, starting with the lilies. We sprayed the foliage to runoff in late April, mid-May, and again in early June and in July.



Just be aware that we are not talking about Lysol like you would buy at the grocery store for cleaning your kitchen or bath. Those contain a LOT more additives such as soaps, degreasers, and more fragrance, and those WILL damage plants. We are talking about Lysol® Brand I.C.™ Quaternary Disinfectant Cleaner. It is a hospital and commercial type disinfectant that is easily found online at places

that sell cleaning supplies, Amazon, and maybe also at Costco and Sam's Club.

After that eureka moment with the lilies we started spraying our hosta area with Lysol I.C., again at a rate of 2 teaspoons per gallon, but this time applied only a light spray to the entire growing area. After two weeks the deer had not touched any of our hostas and after three weeks only started to munch on flower scapes. After four weeks they were eating hosta leaves again. This was the longest we had gone all season without deer damage, even after spraying the

perimeter with liquid fence and twice dusting the whole place with blood meal and granular Repels All.

After this test as an all around deer deterrent we continued to spray the rest of the property. We found that it was not harmful to most of the perennial plants here, but if you are going to try this yourself, please test on a few of your own plants first to make sure you don't cause damage. Also be sure to spray downwind so you don't get Lysol in your eyes as that could burn too, and follow other label directions for safe handling. We also sprayed in the late evening so the spray wouldn't evaporate too quickly & can sometimes cause leaf damage and we weren't sure if this would also happen with the Lysol.

So what is the verdict on the Lysol vs. deer, happy accident in the summer of 2015?

Our preliminary tests have clearly shown that a diluted spray of Lysol I.C. Disinfectant Cleaner acted as a deterrent to deer grazing in our 5 acres of

growing areas, gardens, production houses, and sales area, though it really didn't act as a repellent. We still saw deer walking through, often eating clover and grass in the pathways, so we will still be incorporating applications of Liquid Fence, blood meal, and Repels All to try and keep them out as well.

This was a particularly tough year for us with deer since a doe decided to have twins right here at the nursery this spring. Those fawns grew up playing out back and even greeting a few customers on the pathways, so it took an extra effort to stop their feeding. In the past Liquid Fence did a great job to repel them from the perimeter, but this year they started inside so the Lysol ended up being a big plant saver. If you decide to try it yourself please let us know how it goes!
