### DHSWP 101 – The First Five Years! A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE By Chuck Olescyski

To better acquaint newer members and to jog the memories of senior members a brief history of our club follows. How many of these events did you attend and do you remember some of the characters who steered our early attempts to educate our members about the genus Hosta and Daffodils?

#### THE FIRST FIVE YEARS!!!

Jan 1, 1992 – The Daffodil and Shady Garden Club held its first meeting. Twelve shady members attended and dues were set at \$5.00. The first program was 180 slides of hostas in famous gardens.

*March 7, 1993* – The club changed its name to The Daffodil and Hosta Society of Western Pennsylvania.

**April 17, 1993** -The first daffodil exhibit was held at the Northland Library with Dianne Mrak as chairperson.

**June 5, 1993** – The first Hosta exhibit was held at the Northland Library with Bette Comfrey as chairperson. Thanks to Clarence Rauch for making the display signs for both shows.

**July 7, 1993** – Tom Tindall (one of our founding fathers) hosted the first club picnic.

**September 19, 1993** – The club held its first daffodil sale & auction.

October 24, 1993 – The first election of officers was held.

President – Walt Betzold VP – Steve Hampson

Treasurer – Bette Comfrey

Secretary - Janet Klages

February 13, 1994 – Len Lehman (our in-house horticultulist) created the first special award for The

Best Cyclamineus daffodil. *March 13, 1994* – The club voted to affiliate with the Great Lakes Region of the AHS.

**July 1994** – First 'road trip' with 13 members driving to Van Wade's and Bob Kuk's.

**August 1994** – Club picnic held at Bette Comfrey's Silvermist Gardens.

**October 1994** – Name tags were created to be worn at meetings.

(Do you know where your name tag is)???

**December** 1994 – Club purchases liability insurance.

**January 1, 1995** – Both shows were held at the North Hills Village Mall.

**September 10, 1995** – The club held a referendum ballot on the issue of creating 2 clubs or staying together as one.

**November 12, 1995** – By a close vote the members decided to remain as one club. New officers included:

VP Ed Easter,

Treasurer Toby Exter

Secretary Janet Klages.

By-Laws were created by a committee consisting of Bill Cadman, John Dittmer, Len Lehman, and Dianne Mrak.

*March 10, 1996* – By-Laws were enacted. The shows moved to Phipps Conservatory.

**April 1996** – First daffodil open garden at Dianne Mrak.

**June 1996** – First hosta open garden at Barbara & John Dittmer's.

**August 1996** – Club picnic (one of many) held at Zolocks botanical gardens.

October 13, 1996 – Election of officers held under the new By-Laws.

VP Hostas - Len Lehman

Treasurer - Toby Exter

Secretary - Janet Klages.

Club agrees to participate in the hosta newsletter exchange and to raise dues to \$8.00 annually. (Hmmm...much to be learned and shared by exchanging newsletters)...Do we still do this???

**November 1996** – First club banquet. (Does anyone recall the location of this banquet)?

#### **QUESTON OF THE WEEK**

Q – I heard we can grow new vegetable plants from our scraps from the kitchen this winter. Is this possible? What are the details? – Shelly from Austintown

A – Yes, these kitchen scraps can be recycled into new plants! We all know that food scrapes are great for our compost pile, but they are so much more! What a great way to get the kids and grandkids interested in growing things during winter. In the dead of winter when all gardeners are longing to see something green, I call growing kitchen scraps horticultural therapy! Most of the vegetables will send out roots or leaves quickly. Here are some ideas to try:

**Green Onions:** Save the bottom 3" of a green onion/shallot. Use a clean vase or Mason jar, with ~4" of water. Place on sunny windowsill. Change the water every day or so. You'll see growth in a few days.

**Garlic:** So easy. Just place a clove in a pot of soil. Keep in in a sunny place, water when dry.

**Celery:** Cut the bottom off, place in a bowl with warm water in direct sunlight. You'll see new leaves in a week or so.

**Pineapple:** Cut off the top, insert a few toothpicks to hold above a container filled with water. Place in sunlight. Change water every day or so. Keep water just below base. You should see roots in a week or so. Transplant into soil.

Other ideas: Save some orange seeds, dry them and plant in soil. You'll have an orange tree! Although

you don't have the perfect conditions and won't produce an exceptional plant in all cases, it is a fun way to enjoy the winter months. And yes - some things can be transplanted outside when warmer weather arrives!
