TIME AND TALENT SURVEY RESULTS - BY THE NUMBERS!

This first report or summary will attempt to identify areas where responders are tallied according to numbers recorded via the survey sheets.

Thirty one (31) surveys were passed out to DHSWP members and guests at the End of Year Banquet on November 4th 2023.

Twenty one (21) surveys were completed while 10 surveys were returned with no responses as to areas of interest or attention.

A GIFT FROM AUDREY

This fall, I received a gift from Audrey—two handmade planters filled with sedums.

I met her daughter in my sophomore year of college, and we became instant best friends. When I would travel home with her for long weekends, her parents were always kind.

Her dad would check my brakes, tires, and other parts of the car he knew I would neglect. The car inspection was always followed by a lecture about safety and car maintenance, but I was a young college gal who pumped gas and didn't think much more about auto care.

Audrey was cheerful yet a bit anxious – well, she did raise six kids, so I'll give her the tendency to be a bit high-strung. Her plate was full.

As they were becoming empty nesters, the once busy parents stepped outside and began to garden. It became a passion.

The front yard pride was a Korean Fir tree and the purple-colored pine cones it would produce. Other perennials filled beds.

The back garden was a series of raised beds with a stone pathway and concrete stepping stones the couple created. The beds were filled with perennials. At one time, there was even a koi pond to add to the garden's serenity.

Lenten roses – hellebores - were favorites. Ferns created borders under shade trees. There were coneflowers and hibiscus mixed with other summerblooming perennials. It was their private oasis.

As their free time increased, so did their interest in hostas and succulents. Trips to nurseries and weekend festivals filled their weekends. They became members of the Hosta Society. Soon, their gardens were filled with many different varieties.

Audrey and her husband took classes during these weekend getaways and learned to make hypertufa planters. Using a mixture of cement, perlite, and peat moss, they would fill molds of different shapes to create custom containers. The last count was over fifty planters filled the back garden. Many were planted with her beloved succulents.

It is these planters that her daughter shared with me. Audrey and her husband are now in their 90s, and the intricate designs of the garden have become too much to manage. This year also brought new health challenges.



This Christmas holiday will be the first time the couple married sixty-seven years will not be home. After 60 of Christmas mornings in their split-level living room, they have moved to be provided with more care. The family has worked to maintain the gardens, but with six children spread across the country, each busy with their children and careers, it is hard.

Landscapers have been careless, and weeds continue to grow despite valiant efforts from family. I hope to visit in the early spring. I'm sure memories of college weekends and car repairs will come flooding back.

I expect by this time next year a new family will be making memories in the kitchen and living room. Let's hope they are gardeners who appreciate the carefully planned landscape.

For now, I will cherish my gift of a handmade plant container created by the hands of someone I know. Like all handmade crafts, it is original and one of a kind, much like the matriarch of the family who grew her family and her garden to give and provide beauty to all who visit.

AHS HOSTA POPULARITY POLL 2022, A Commentary

Having received the latest copy of the AHS Journal (Volume 54 Number 2) I was somewhat dismayed at recent developments concerning the Popularity Poll.

As most folks know the survey allows members to cast their votes for their favorite hostas. Based on member input, hybridizers and nursery owners take their cues for what's hot, and what's not, and we in turn can benefit by what they offer in their hosta productions.

Just 52 people sent in ballots. I need to question if this is a fair representation from the hundreds of AHS members. But rather than dwelling on reasons why so few folks responded to this year's ballot, let's review a few results.

Perhaps the most startling find is that H. 'June' has been dethroned! Since 2011 'June' has maintained its long run as the standard bearer only to be ousted by Hosta 'Lakeside Paisley Print'. It's definitely a 10 footer. (10 footer – describes a hosta that wows from a distance of 10 feet or more.)

New to the poll are 'Coast to Coast' (ranked at number 8) and 'On Stage'. The number 1 mini is...H. 'Blue Mouse Ears'. Hmmm...guess the 'mice' hostas devoured the H. "Cat Eyes'.

DAFFODIL AND HOSTA SOCIETY OF WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA CONSTITUTION

Article VI - Duties Of The Officers

Section 1. The President shall preside at meetings of the Society, shall appoint all other needed Committee Chairpersons, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees. The President shall report annually on the state of the Society and present a proposed calendar and budget for the forthcoming year.

Section 2. The Vice-Presidents shall assume the responsibilities of the President in the absence of the President, and shall assume primary responsibility for their respective divisions.

Section 3. The treasurer shall keep charge of all Society funds and be responsible for the disbursement of all obligations of the Society. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures and shall prepare an annual financial report.

Section 4. An audit will be held during the third year of each three year term or more often if deemed necessary by the Steering Committee.

DHSWP By-Laws

Section 1. The Steering Committee shall meet at least twice a year or more as needed to perform its responsibilities. Minor decisions can be made via phone or e-mail as appropriate.

Section 2. The President

- Presides at business and Steering Committee meetings
- Prepares the calendar for the approval of the Steering Committee
- Works with the treasurer to prepare an annual budget for approval by the Steering Committee
- With the 2 VPs, arranges for a location for our shows
- Appoints an audit committee
- Maintains the responsibility for finding appropriate storage for the society's properties
- Appoints a nominating committee
- Assigns a member who agrees and is qualified to oversee the societies website
- Verifies that the society's insurance is adequate and up to date
- Verifies that the society has a space to hold each meeting, the picnic and the banquet
- Oversees any necessary revisions to the constitution and by-laws
- Writes articles for the newsletter
- Assists other members of the Steering Committee as needed
- Sets dates for meetings of the Steering Committee
- · Appoints committees and chairperson as needed for society's affairs
- Keeps necessary records and acts as a resource to assist the next person who fills the position

Section 3. The Vice-Presidents of Daffodils and Hosta (2)

- Presides over meetings in the absence of the president
- Makes arrangements for programs
- Assumes responsibility for the annual shows
- Assists with calendar and budget preparations
- · Arranges for the purchase of plants for sales and auctions
- Solicits the donation of paints and other materials for sales and auctions
- Maintains auction and sales records as needed
- Promotes the educational goals of the society
- Encourages members to join the national organizations and to attend regional and national meetings
- Encourages members to attend judges clinics and to vote in popularity polls
- Writes articles for the newsletter and/or selects articles for reprinting in our newsletter

- Arranges for the purchase of club gift awards
- Arranges for the sale of hosta and daffodil related items to the members
- Works with the member at large to attract and keep new members
- Keeps necessary records and acts as a resource to assist the next person who fills the position

Section 5. Secretary

- Attends Steering Committee meetings and records minutes
- Attends Membership meetings. Record minutes and present minutes from prior meeting to membership
- Send copies of minutes to the President, Newsletter Editor, and other designees as the president/SC deems
- appropriate. Arrange to have newsletter editor publish minutes in newsletter.
- Send Thank You card to the person/place where meeting was held to thank them for their hospitality.
- Send thank You card to any speakers that have attended our meetings thanking them for their presentation
- Send appropriate cards or flowers to members who are ill or who have had a death in the family
- Receive reports from Chairpersons and keep them on file
- Keep copies of the current Constitution and By-Laws at meetings for reference and ensure that proper procedure
- is followed for filing/passing a motion.
- Have a current membership list on hand for purposes of communication
